Friends and Family Interview (FFI) Training Seminar Over Zoom, 4th and 5th December 2024 With Professor Howard Steele <steeleh@newschool.edu>

What: The training will teach how to administer, rate and classify response to the FFI

For whom: Clinicians and researchers working with youth aged 8-16 years

To be taught by: Professor Howard Steele

Why: The FFI asks youth what they like best and what they like least in themselves. their best friends, siblings, and relationships with mother and father. It also queries what the young person does when s/he is upset, asks about what they imagine important others may think about themselves, and invites consideration of how the self changes, and stays the same, over the course of development. The FFI is in wide use in clinical settings, adoption research and mainstream developmental research, with a number of publications in print. The interviews are audio-recorded, and ideally filmed, take 20-30 minutes to administer. The interview is developed on the model of the Adult Attachment Interview and FFI responses been shown to correlate with parental responses to the AAI. Like the AAI, FFI responses are rated on multiple dimensions tapping into inferred experiences with family and friends, emotion-regulation strategies, and extent of coherence and reflective functioning (or state of mind) in thinking about self and attachment relationships. A 20-interview reliability test will be distributed at the end of the two-day training. The FFI is widely used, and previously validated with more than 15 peer-reviewed publications in print from diverse independent labs.

Costs: To participate in the three-day seminar, and receive the post-seminar set of 15+ interviews to rate and classify and so take the reliability test, the cost for senior professional 10+ years in practice is \$1,000 US dollars, junior professionals with less than ten years in practice \$750 and \$500 for undergrad or grad students. Howard Steele and Miriam Steele developed the Friends and Family Interview (FFI) questions and companion Coding System and validated it as an attachment measure (Steele & Steele, 2005). It has since been taught to many around the globe with many independent studies showing it's validity.

Howard Steele was among the 2017 Bowlby-Ainsworth Awardees so recognized by the Center for Mental Health Promotion. Howard Steele and Miriam Steele are co-editors of the 2008 book, *Clinical Applications of the Adult Attachment Interview*, and the 2018 *Handbook of Attachment-Based Interventions*, both published by the Guilford Press, New York.
